Note:

Read a Psalm or two. Then read a chapter or two in the Old Testament, and a chapter or two in the New Testament in the order indicated.

If one chapter each is read a day, in a little over two years, you'll read the OT once, the NT more than 3 times, and the Psalms more than 4 times. If you do 2 chapters each, you'll cover the same material in a little over a year.

NT Epistles are clustered around the Gospels for variety and similarity of theme. OT prophets and poets are grouped by general historical era so that they are read close to the historical events of their day.
